New Crew Leader Training Available

Great Trails Don't Happen by Accident



Great trails are the result of intelligent design, and best practices in construction and maintenance. Much of trail construction seems like common sense once someone shows you the whys and hows of design and construction. Good intentions without proper knowledge can do more harm to the park than good.

With recent growth in participation in workdays at the park, we need to train additional crew leaders to lead work parties. Also, we need enough crew leaders to assist with volunteer groups that want to work at other times than our regular 2nd Saturday workdays. With enough volunteers, and trained leaders, we can accomplish several projects at once.

We are prepared to teach a crew leader certification class on 4 consecutive workdays once we have at least seven (7) volunteers signed up. We'll do the practical portion of the class during our morning workday, and the classroom portion in the afternoon.



The 4 classes are 1) Trail Design, 2) Trail Construction, 3) Trail Maintenance, and 4) Crew Leadership and Minimizing Visitor Impacts.

Matching Grants

From a letter received by the Club dated September 13, 2007, KEMOTrail Corps, Inc. is approved to receive matching grants on a cash basis of up to \$5,000 per calendar year. IBM will match on a 1 to 1 cash basis for active employees, and ½ to 1 cash basis for retired employees. The club can elect IBM logo equipment / software credit in lieu of the cash match. Gifts are matched at a ratio of 2 to 1 for active employees, and 1 to 1 for retired employees.

Respect Our History - How Soon We Forget

I and I'm sure many of you love Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park, for its natural beauty and plentiful trails. But, how often do we stop to think about and remember the more than five thousand three hundred fifty (5,350) Americans killed right here in Kennesaw, Georgia between June 19th and July 2, 1864. We are reminded

every evening on the 6:00 PM News about the number of Americans killed and wounded in far away places like Afghanistan and Iraq.

On my recent visit to the Gettysburg National Military Park in Pennsylvania, I was amazed at the Gettysburg National Military Park. I was amazed at the preservation and restoration work that has been accomplished in the park by the organizations that recently merged to form the Gettysburg Foundation.

I was impressed with how the park is integrated and plays a significant role in the economic and social life of the community. Gettysburg even has an Adopt-a-Monument program that is similar to our Adopt-a-Road program.

I saw similar accomplishments at Acadia National Park on Mount Desert Island (i.e. Bar Harbor) Maine. The Friends of Acadia National Park started small - kind of like the KEMOTrail Corps, by maintaining the trails and carriage road in the park, and has grown over the last 20 years or so into a very well-funded and sponsored Friends organization that has contributed greatly to the improvement of the park and the community. The Friends of Acadia National Park, in partnership with LL Bean, even provides a free propane-powered bus service that covers all of the important stopping points, campgrounds, and hotels on Mount Desert Island.

These experiences leave me convinced that we (The Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club) are on the right track with our efforts to maintain and develop the trails in the park. We have stepped up to accept the 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009 Challenge Grant Opportunities being offered by the National Park Service. The new bridge at Barfield Bottoms installed this year, and the new signs, kiosks, and Trail Ambassador Program being implemented next year are all steps in the right direction for preserving and enhancing the value of Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park to the community and to other visitors from other places.

We manage our pets by:

- o Keeping them safely leashed
- o Not letting them approach other visitors unless invited
- o Using the available "Poop" bags to pick up and remove their waste to the trash cans at the trail heads.

National Park Service Purchases New Ditch Witch to Expedite Construction of New Trail on Kennesaw Mountain



Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park has purchased a new diesel-powered mini-skid loader by Ditch Witch called an SK 650. The new machine with its 6-way blade and more powerful engine provides a dramatic increase in our ability to construct new trails and repair existing trails.

Randall Bailey, in the foreground wearing the green head band, was awarded the Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park Volunteer of the year award for his heroic work in coordinating all of the details and managing the work of building the new equestrian bridge across John Ward Creek at Barfield Bottoms.

The Barfield Bottoms Bridge is the largest and most expensive project we have undertaken in the five (5) year history of the trail club. The bridge was obtained through a National Park Service Challenge Grant of \$30,000 dollars which is matched by over 1,900 hours of volunteer service by the trail club.

Randall was the leader who made the entire project come together. He spent endless hours communicating and coordinating with the park, with vendors, with the engineers at E.T. Tectonics who designed and manufactured the bridge, and with the host of volunteers who put it all together.

Our congratulations again to Randall Bailey for an award that's richly deserved.

Help Wanted — Project Leader - Trail Signs and Kiosks

We need a volunteer to take on the project leader responsibility for managing the major portion of our 2007 NPS Challenge Grant.

The task involves working closely with the staff at the Park, as well as the board and membership of the Trail Club to:

1. Coordinate with NPS Management a new reasonable Target Completion Date for the project.
2. Assist the Park staff to gather and document the specifications and locations for the 61 new trail directional signs.
3. Gather and document specifications for the 7 3 panel Kiosks to be placed at the park trail heads.
4. Obtain quotes from the NPS sole source vendors, and obtain quotes from at least 3 other sources for the signs and kiosks.
5. Obtain approval from the KEMOTrail Corps Board of Directors and NPS Management for the procurement.
6. Manage ordering and delivery of the materials.
7. Schedule and coordinate installation of the signs and kiosks.
8. Track all hours and volunteer participation in the project and report to the Membership Director.
9. Prepare a final project review and summary to present to the Board and to Park Management.

The funds are in the bank. The original target completion date is November 29, 2007.
